On December 18, 2007, Professor Karen Olness attended the Graduation ceremony at Khon Kaen University to receive an Honorary Doctorate Degree in Medicine from Her Royal Highness Princess Maha Chakri Sirindhorn. Professor Karen is a Professor of Pediatrics in Family Medicine and Global Health at Case Western Reserve University (CWRU), Cleveland, USA. She is also the Founding Director of Rainbow Center for Global Child Health.

"I am very grateful to Khon Kaen University and the Faculty of Medicine

for bestowing this honor upon me. I consider it symbolic of the strong and productive relationship that Khon Kaen University has had with Case Western Reserve University for nearly 20 years. I am proud to have been part of this relationship and to have received this honorary degree. I hope that the linkage between Khon Kaen University and Case Western Reserve University will continue for many years to come," Professor Karen remarked.

Professor Karen has had an important role in teaching and mentoring doctors, residents and students at the Faculty of Medicine, as well as encouraging the Faculty to strive for international medical standards. She actively supported the Department of Pediatrics as a trainer of the Curriculum for Pediatric Residency Training in "International Child Health," the first curriculum of its kind in the USA. She also initiated Pediatric Residency training in Lao PDR, for which the Faculty of Medicine has been a main cooperating institute. This curriculum is being expanded to the Department of Medicine.

Professor Karen played an important role in establishing Khon Kaen as a leader in Disaster Child Care by training staff from the Faculties of Medicine and Nursing, and encouraging the Faculty of Medicine and the American Academy of Pediatrics to hold the international training workshop in Khon Kaen, "Complex Humanitarian Emergencies: Focus on Children and Families". She encouraged Khon Kaen University's helping victims from the 2004 Asian Tsunami with support from UNICEF and the International Pediatrics Association.

In addition, Professor Karen strengthened the knowledge and practice of hypnosis among physicians and nurses treating patients suffering refractory mental and physical pain. Professor Karen strongly supported physicians and nurses' participating in international conferences so that the Faculty of Medicine could become an international leader in Pediatric Pain Management.

In Pediatric Developmental and Behavioral Sciences, Professor Karen was a trainer for the Department of Pediatrics and Psychiatry. Over the years, she has actively encouraged 65 professors, residents and medical students to attend the subspecialty training and academic visits.

For 20 years, Professor Karen has kindly coordinated with institutions in the USA so that Thai medical students from the Faculty of Medicine could attend exchange & elective programs. She also assisted in organizing a seminar on medical curriculum development at the Faculty of Medicine with faculty from the USA and the UK.

On account of this life of great dedication to the development of medicine and improved healthcare, the University Council of Khon Kaen University resolved that Professor Karen Olness should be awarded an Honorary Doctorate Degree in Medicine.

"Professor Karen Olness offers a unique opportunity and experience for our students and staffs to gain knowledge from the U.S. They all come back and develop their works and skills for KK community," says Professor Wiroon Laupatarakasem, Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, Khon Kaen University, "We are very proud and lucky to have this opportunity to get to know Proessor Olness for this 20 years."

"No person has been more involved with international training in pediatrics than Professor Karen Olness," says Associate Professor Arunee Jetsrisuparb, Head of Pediatrics Department, the Faculty of Medicine, Khon Kaen University.

House for Patients' Relatives at Srinagarind Hospital

Twenty years ago, His Majesty King Bhumibol Adulyadej observed a need for better accommodations for relatives of inpatients attending Srinagarind Hospital, so that patients could receive encouragement from their relatives. "This is above the textbooks. Being above the textbooks is good but we can do better," His Majesty wryly noted.

Professor Dr. Kawee Tungsubut said, "when relatives and neighbors came to visit patients some slept and cooked on the balcony, so we initiated the building of a house for patients' relatives after the completion of our main buildings."

In 1988, motivated by the King's words, the 14th Class of Medical Students at KKU under the leadership of Mr. Sawate Srisiri, a medical student, organized a fundraising marathon through 4 provinces including Bangkok, Ubonratchathani, Nong Khai and Khon Kaen between May 29 and June 4, 1988. The marathon raised 2,5 million Baht in donations. Dr. Sawate Srisiri, currently Head of Surgery at Suppasithiprasong Hospital, Ubonratchathani, said, "I learned many important lessons through staging this marathon which I apply to my work management to this day. As economics, society and politics change, each generation of medical students has to adjust their attitudes so that they can be effective in society."

"Everyday, we have 500-600 patients and relatives staying with us of whom 60% are cancer patients waiting for radiotherapy and chemotherapy. For example, a relative of a patient at 5C Ward has been staying at this house for 5 years," Mrs. Nattarada Taweesuwan, Head of the house for patients' relatives at Srinagarind Hospital said. "There are four buildings, one each for: women, men, families and general purposes. The daily income of our tenants is between 600 and 2,000 Baht, so our rate is only3 Baht per night. We also coordinate with the Social Welfare Section for patients who do not have enough money to return home. In addition to income from guests, we receive about 16,000 Baht from donation boxes which we open every 3 months. We provide sleeping mats donated by the Khon Kaen Provincial Administrative Organization and blankets donated from Nurse Day. We have electrical fans and televisions which we turn on after 4:30 p.m. As part of their training, our staff attends basic emergency training. For a more pleasant environment, we landscaped our grounds, constructed a waterfall and planted trees around the buildings," she said.
